If you can, please come and help, even for an hour to give someone else a break.

We have certainly been busy around the shed, constructing our lovely new veranda and deck, installing another container for storage, and erecting another small shed. That deck certainly looks like it could be a big hit with the coffee and tea drinkers over the summer months. It is part of our facilities, to be used by all, only time will tell what its best use will be.



There is still lots to be done to get our shed spick and span, but with a little help from a lot of hands it will happen. Our next major project and expenditure will be the restoration / installation of the outdoor security lights. This will give us both enhanced security and the ability to use the facility at night, should we wish to so do.

We have secured some funding from the IMB Bank to instigate a Caring for Kids program which involves us engaging with the local day-care and preschools. Our aim is to provide a free service to repair broken garden furniture, build new toys for the kids or set up street libraries or bird-boxes for them, meanwhile spreading the word that there are older men in the community who can make a difference to the lives of others.

Who knows what the future hold? We'll just have to see where the new year takes us, eh?
